[9] What the 'Chinese tiger mom' debate swirling around Amy Chua's book fails to adequately consider is the fact that American classrooms, and society in general, are more conducive to individual expression and innovation. The 'tiger mom' approach that she stresses at home might work for her Chinese daughters because, outside the home in America, they are encouraged to think independently.

[10] Many young Chinese lament there is no Bill Gates of China. And the most cutting-edge scientific institutions are research centers run by Western-educated administrators wooing Chinese-born scientists back from the West, where they had relocated in order to enjoy the more rewarding research environment abroad. If they had the money and the clout and the personal connections to do so, Chinese moms would want to send their kids to Harvard (as several top-level Chinese leaders have done). In other words, the key to success is seen as a hybrid of East and West, at least when viewed from the lair of the Tiger Moms.



Extracts of Data File:

Recent statistics concerning the exercising pattern has drawn the concern of health experts. Half

the young people interviewed do not actually do exercise and the figure has increased by 30 per

cent compared with the same survey conducted a decade ago. To counter this trend, Dr Martin
